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Peppermint Cupcakes

A Holiday Recipe for you from Lil Mama Cakes



1 ¼ cups all-purpose flour
 1 ¼ tsp. baking powder
 1¼ tsp. salt, 1 cup sugar
 6 tbsp. butter
 1 large egg
 1 large egg white
 1 tsp. peppermint extract
 1⁄2 cup whole milk
 Crushed candy canes

Preheat oven to 350. In a bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, and salt. In another bowl, with an electric mixer on medium-high speed, beat the sugar and butter together until light and fluffy, 2-3 minutes. Add the egg, egg white, and ½ tsp. of peppermint extract and beat until combined. Add the flour mixture in 3 additions, alternating with the milk in 2 additions, beating on low speed until just combined. Fill tins 2/3 full. Bake 18-20 minutes.

Peppermint Buttercream

3 sticks of room temperature butter

- 3¹/₂ cups powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. milk
- 1 tsp. peppermint extract

Blend butter and powdered sugar together until creamy. Mix in milk and extract until combined. Frost cooled cupcakes with frosting and top with crushed candy canes.

Makes 1 dozen cupakes

Create a Vanity Desk Area



Note: By the time of this printing, the Candidate Forum scheduled for Nov. 29, will have taken place. To help you in your decision, I am reprinting the candidate statements here. The HSTA will house a locked ballot box in the office. The keys to open the ballot box will be kept offsite at the AMI offices and no one will have access to open the ballot box until the AMI President and/or Owner delivers the keys back to the HSTA on December 12th after the adjournment of the Annual Meeting when the election officially closes. Proxy ballots can be dropped off before that time in the Green HSTA Drop-box located in the Postal Room and will be gathered by the HSTA daily, however in order to assure credibility The HSTA will have two witnesses signify that the ballots were transferred to the ballot box immediately and without being tampered with.

Dean Hastriter

Born and raised in Nampa, I graduated from Boise State University in 1993 with a degree in History after competing throughout the nation as a member of the BSU wrestling team. Forgoing a career in teaching and coaching, I began work in the concrete construction industry upon graduation and have worked as a general and specialty contractor for the past 19 years.

My work as a construction manager has helped me hone skills such as problem solving, conflict resolution, affecting compromise among various stakeholders, adherence to deadlines, and a strong desire to contribute quality products and ideas to quality projects.

My wife Carrie and I became the sole owners of Hastriter Construction Inc. in 2003 and I have worked closely with developers of planned communities throughout the Treasure Valley ever since. 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Cleaning Your Indoor Air

Winter in the Treasure Valley can often feel like never ending, drearyness. The lack of sunlight, strong inversions, and cold weather can take its toll on anybody's temperament. I suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). I believe my case of SAD is a fairly strong one. For instance, my typical approach to December and January is simply to crawl under my bed and hide until March. But I've recently decided to try staving out from under the furniture, and actually dealing with my problem! So,... I went to the store and bought some new houseplants to add to my existing collection around the house.

You probably already know that plants remove nasty toxins from the air, but did you know that they can also, reduce stress, lower illness rates, and even improve your concentration? According to a study done by the Norway University of Agriculture, indoor plants not only remove toxins, but they can reduce fatigue and many cold-related illnesses by increasing humidity levels and removing dust from the air. These same tests also showed that attentiveness and memory increase considerably due to the added oxygen put into the air by houseplants.

All plants clean the air and release oxygen, but these plants are easy care and especially hard workers!

Philodendron - any type Dracena - Janet Craig Chlorphytum - spider plant Dracena - Marginata Pothos - any type Bamboo Palm Sanseveria - snake plant Spathaphylum - Peace Lily

I don't know about you, but I think the best reason to buy some new houseplants is that even a slight change in our daily 'scenery' is always welcomed this time of year. And what better way to create change than with beautiful, living, and oxygen-giving, greenery! There is little that brings more cheer to a room than a live plant. And you don't have to buy big plants, or very many. A few of those little 4" potted plants and maybe one of the 6" plants can make a big difference. Add a couple that bloom, (African violets), to brighten the spirit! Ah, and we mustn't forget, bright colored pots can do even more to brighten our mood, which also creates a great opportunity to have some fun!

To take this idea a step further,... we already know that a good night's sleep can reduce stress and improve your mental & physical health, so in addition to using plants in areas of daytime use, try bromeliads,

DYNAMIS ENERGY Waste to Energy Plant

On November 8, the Idaho Citizens group filed a lawsuit against Ada County claiming the actions of Commissioners Sharon Ullman, Rich Yzaguire and former Commissioner Fred Tilman, violated state law in the contracts created with Dynamis Energy.

On November 14, the commissioners sent a letter to Dynamis Energy demanding that the \$2 million fronted to them be repaid, per the language in one of the contracts.

On November 19, the Idaho Conservation League also filed a lawsuit against the county over the leasing of landfill land to Dynamis Energy.

As of this writing there has been no public response from Dynamis Energy and no court date assigned for either lawsuit.

Housecats wipe out some 4 billion animals every year, including at least 500 million birds, reports Wyoming Wildlife. The camera recorded the cats averaged about 2.1 kills per week, but they brought home less than 25% of their victims. 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
Visit the Idaho Aquarium over the Holidays. And say "hi" to Beam!

The Idaho Aquarium is now open to the public 10am to 8pm daily. Our 10,000 square foot facility houses over 35,000



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
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
